

## History

1907 The original Pontiac site was constructed in 1907 as Pontiac Varnish Company, producing paint for high-end buggies, and later the emerging automotive industry.

1983 Following several acquisitions over the next eight decades, the site was acquired by Akzo in 1983 as part of the Wyandotte Paint Products acquisition, securing a position in the North American automotive paint market.

1989 Unveiled a modern manufacturing building to produce Sikkens Car Refinishes - the first time Sikkens was produced in North America. Over time, the site has manufactured different product lines for Performance Coatings, and also a wood care line for Decorative Paints.

2007 A major site expansion was completed to accommodate growth in Vehicle Refinishes and the transfer of the automotive OEM paint business from the original plant.

2008 Original factory decommissioned and demolished.

2019 Transfer of Protective Coatings from Berea.
